INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE GALLEY GALLOP - - July 10, 1982 - - CORSICA RIVER

The race/cruise rendezvous is in the Corsica River east of RENDEZVOUS: R N "2".

Starting line will be between Committee Boat's mast and START LINE: BW N "12B".

If a Committee Boat is on station a yacht will finish between FINISH LINE: it and R N "16" at the mouth of the Corsica River. If no Committee Boat is on station, a yacht will finish when R N "16" is within 50 yards to starboard, and upon crossing a line

extended due west (magnetic) of it.

Leave to starboard R "2" Bell 2.1 mi. NE of Love Pt. COURSE: Leave to port R "6" F1 R 4 sec 1.2 mi. SW of Baybush Pt.

Leave to port "9" F1 4 sec 1.0 mi. S of Cedar Pt.

Leave to port R "12" F1 R 4 sec 0.7 mi. SW of Tilghman Cr. Leave to starboard R N "14" 0.7 mi. SSE of Ringgold Pt.

17.5 miles DISTANCE:

STARTING SIGNALS:

White flag raised - 3 horn blasts 1100

White flag lowered 1104

Blue flag raised - 2 horn blasts 1105

Blue flag lowered 1109

START - Red flag raised - 1 horn blast 1110

Hoisting of flags takes precedence over horn and NOTE: time of day.

TIME LIMIT:

6 hours. Any yacht finishing within the limit shall make the race valid for all other yachts in the race, regardless of time limit. If you are leading and time is short, please notify the trailers that you finished, or did not, within the time limit. Don't make your friends sail and wonder while you motor to the party.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS:

- A female skipper must be at the helm and in command of the yacht at all times.
- State your intention to race by sailing past the Committee 2. Boat's stern prior to 1100 hours.
- Fly a White flag (approx. 12" x 12") from the backstay. 3.
- Racers must give right-of-way to commercial shipping. 4. Violators are subject to disqualification.
- Racers must keep their own elapsed time, to the second, 5. from the START. Make a note of the yachts finishing ahead and astern of you.
- Yachts over the starting line early will be hailed. Early 6. starters must return to restart around either end of the line. The responsibility for returning shall rest with the yacht(s) concerned.

RENDEZVOUS:

The rendezvous is in Fairlee Creek at Great Oaks Yacht Club.

STARTING LINE:

The starting line will be between the Committee Boat's mast and BW N"12B" 1.6 mi NE of Baltimore Light.

FINISH LINE:

If a committee boat is on station, a yacht will finish between it and BW N "23B" located 1 mile N.W. of Fairlee Creek. If no committee boat is on station, a yacht will finish when BW N "23B" is within 50 yards to starboard, and upon crossing a line extended due west (magnetic) of it.

COURSE:

The course is point-to-point without any turning marks.

DISTANCE:

13.8 miles

STARTING SIGNALS:

1100 White flag raised - 3 horn blasts 1104 White flag lowered

Blue flag raised

1109

Blue flag lowered

- 2 horn blasts

1110

START - Red flag raised

- 1 horn blast

MOUTH

Hoisting of flags takes precedence over horn

and time of day.

TIME LIMIT:

5 hours. Any yacht finishing within the limit makes a race of it. \bigstar

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS:

- State your intention to race by sailing past the Committee Boat's stern prior to 1100.
- 2. Fly a white signal (approx. 12" x 12") from the backstay.
- Headsails-working jibs and genoas only. No spinnakers, staysails, drifters, flashers, etc No foresail combinations one headsail only.
- Racers must give right-of-way to commercial shipping.
 Violaters are subject to disqualification.
- 5. Racers must keep thier own elapsed time, to the second, from the START. Make a note of the yachts finishing ahead and astern of you. Report time of finish to Dick Boecker at 301/823-1278.
- 6. Boats over the line early will be hailed. Early starters must return to restart around either end of the start line. Responsibility for returning shall rest with the yacht(s) concerned.
