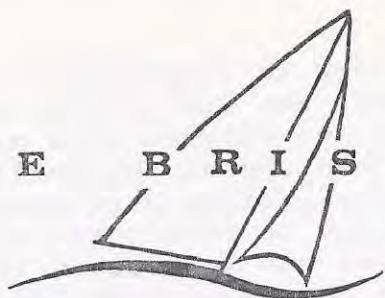

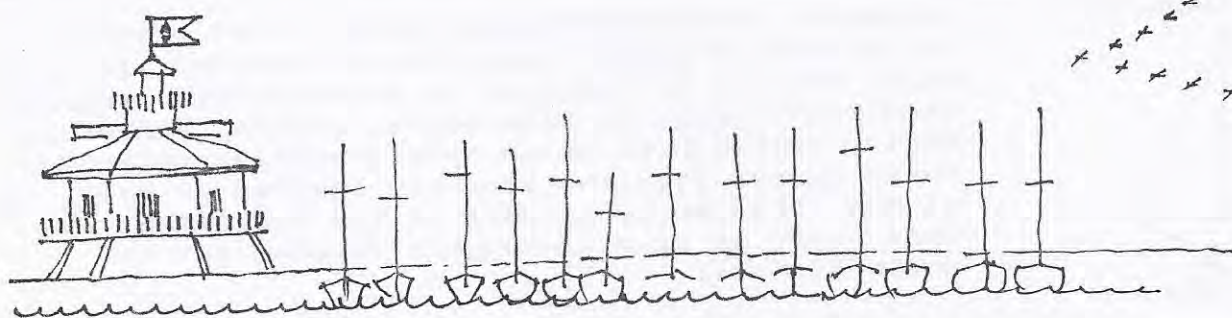

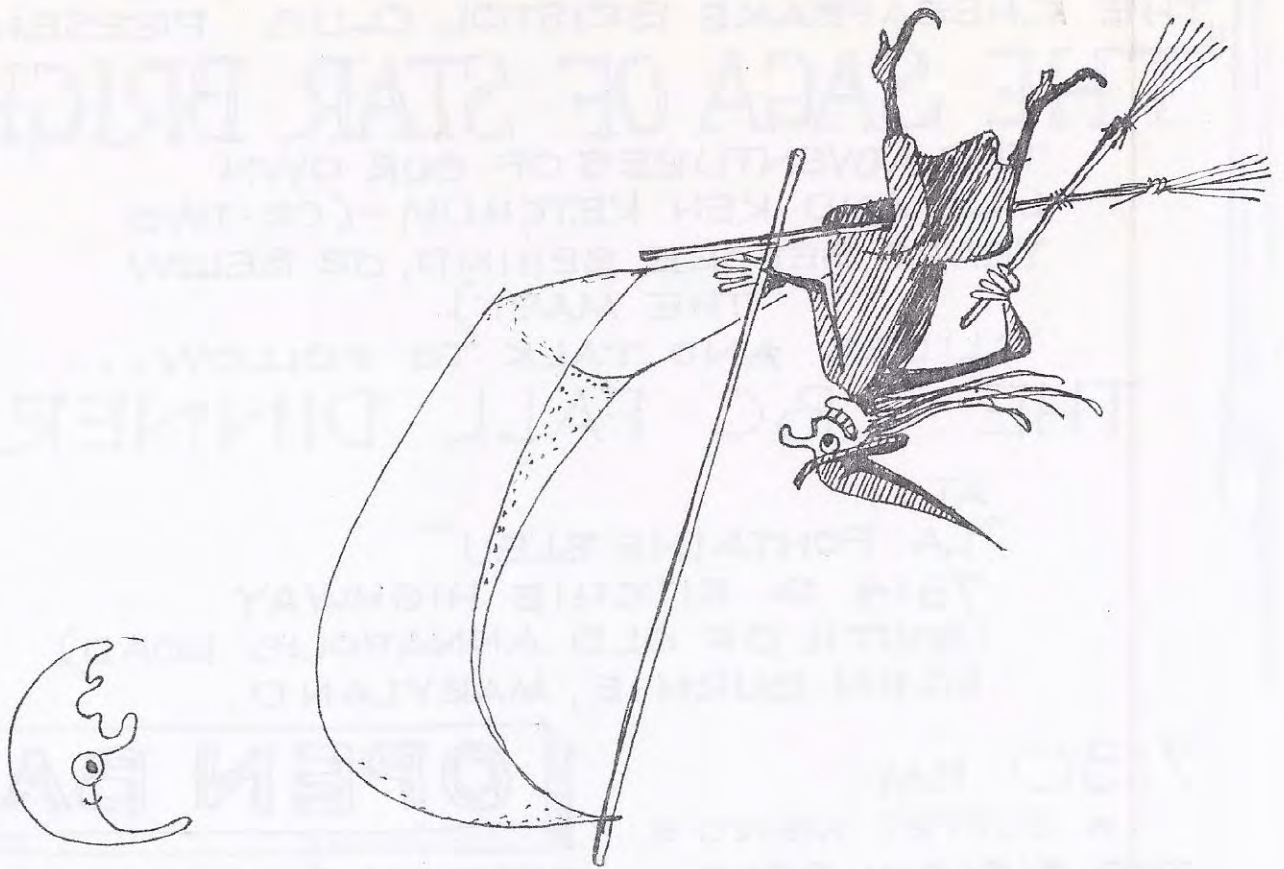
OCTOBER WAS FESTIVE...

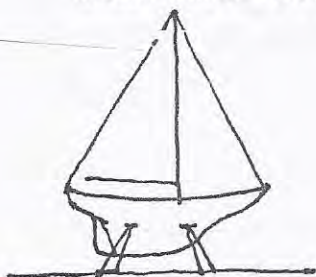

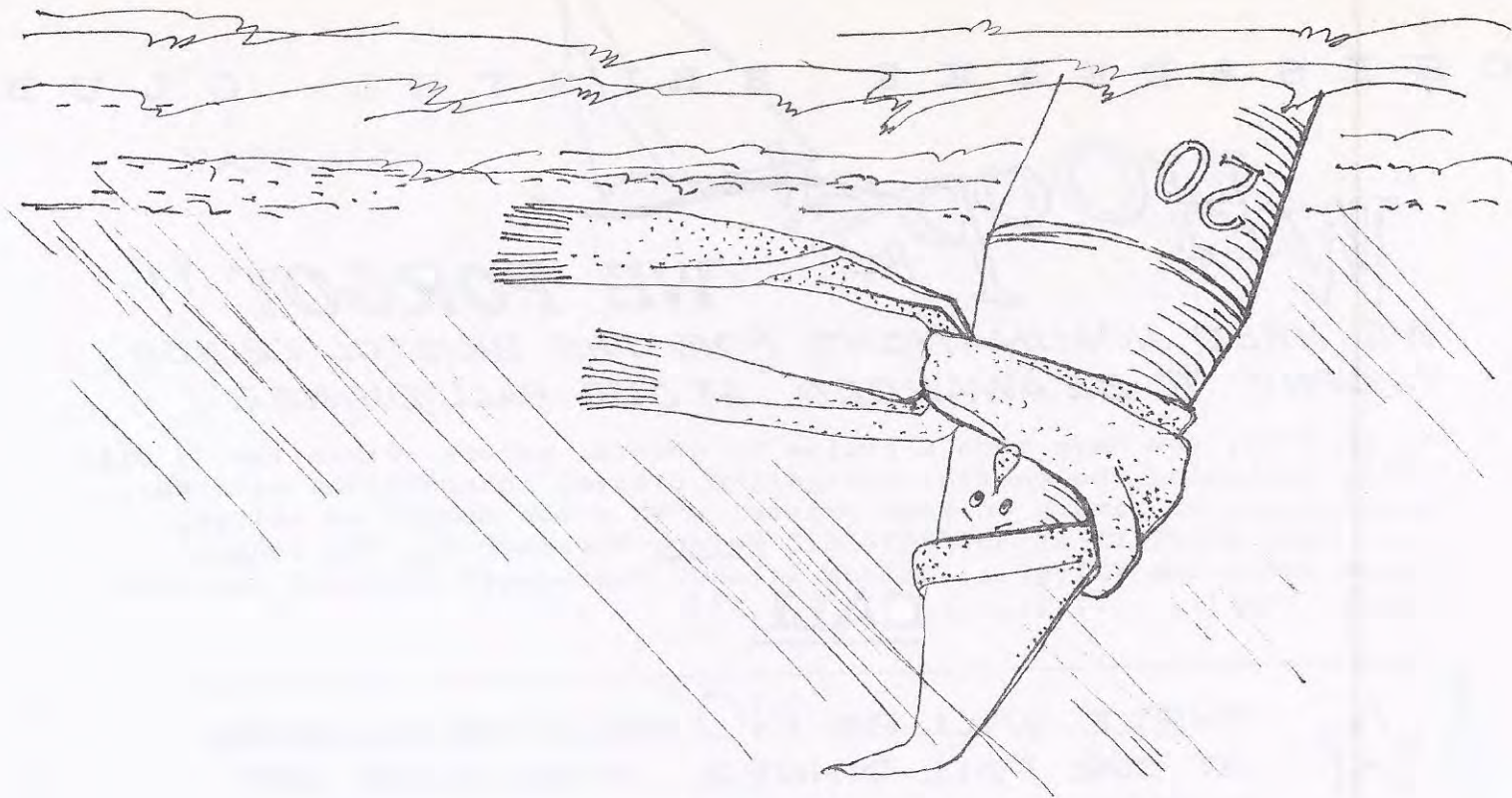
