


CHESAPEAKE

All you people who have been admiring your 1983 trophies this year — the time has come to return them to the Race Chairman —— Sorry, but they are due October 1 st.

Race # SIX, September 22, 1984 (then on to Lake Ogleton & the Crab Feast!)

Start Line: Between the committee boat's mast and #77, flashing 4

sec. gong off Tolly Point.

Course: Leave to port C-75, south of Thomas Point Light

Leave to port W & OR(NS) south measured mile marker

west of Brickhouse Bar

Leave to starboard R-2, fl. $2\frac{1}{2}$ sec.bell east of Tolly

Point

Leave to port R-78, flashing 4 sec. mid channel marker

2 mi. SSW of Bay Bridge.

Finish Line: If a committee boat is on station a yacht will finish between it and C-5, can for Annapolis Channel. If no committee boat is on station, a yacht will finish when

committee boat is on station, a yacht will finish when C-5 is within 50 yards to starboard, and upon crossing

a line due South (mag) of it.

Distance: 12.1 nm

Starting Signals:

1100 - White flag raised - 3 horn blasts

1104 - White flag lowered

1105 - Blue flag raised - 2 horn blasts

1109 - Blue flag lowered

1110 - START - Red Flag raised - 1 horn blast

Note: Hoisting of flags takes precedence over horn and time of day.

Time Limit:

4 hours. One yacht finishing within the limit makes the race valid for all other yachts, regardless of the time limit.

Note: The race can be shortened at any turning mark. Keep your radio tuned to channel #16 for instructions.

Special Instructions:

(a) State your intention to race by sailing past the

Committee boat's stern prior to 1100.

(b) Fly a white flag (approx. 12" x 12") from the backstay.

(c) Headsails; working jibs and genoas only. No spinnakers, staysails, flashers, etc. No foresail combinations - one headsail only.

(d) Racers must give way to commercial shipping. Violators

are subject to disqualification.

(e) Racers must keep their own elapsed time, to the second, from the start. Make a note of the yachts finishing ahead and astern of you.

(f) If no committee boat is on station at the finish or the Race Committee is absent from the rendezvous, call in your elapsed time

by Wednesday night following the race. Phone: 301/823-1278

(g) Yachts of the starting line early will be hailed. Early starters must return to restart around either end of the line. The responsibility for returning shall rest with the yacht(s) concerned.

(h) If you are leading and time is short, please notify the "trailers" that you finished, or did not, within the time limit. Don't make your friends sail and wonder while you motor to the party.



COMMODORES CUP RACE SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 2, 1984

RENDEZVOUS: SATURDAY, GRAY'S INN CREEK SUNDAY , REED CREEK ** *

Between the Committee Boat's mast and R N"16" in the Start Line: mouth of the Corsica River.

Course

Leave to PORT R N "18", 0.3nm NW Spaniard Point(Dist. lnm) Leave to STBD RB C, lnm SSE Nichols Point (Dist. 1.8nm) Leave to STBD AB C, IAM SSE RICHOIS FOIRT (DISt. I.OMM)
Leave to PORT C "1", O.6nm South of Greys Inn Point (Dist. 0.6nm)
Leave to PORT C "1", O.4nm North of Gordon Point (Dist. 1.5nm)
Leave to PORT RB C, Inm SSE Nichols Point (Dist. 0.9nm)
Leave to PORT R N "14", O.4nm East Belts Bar Point (Dist. 2.2nm)
Leave to PORT R N "14", O.4nm East Belts Bar Point (Dist. 2.2nm) Leave to PORT R "12" F1 R 4 Sec, 0.7nm East Hail Point (Dist. 2.1nm)

Finish Line:

If a committee boat is on station a yacht will finish between it and C "l", 0.6nm South of Greys Inn Point. If no committee boat is on station, a yacht will finish when C"l" is within 50 yards to port, and upon crossing a line extended due East (Mag) of it.

Distance : 13.9nm - reference NOS Chart 12272.

Starting Signals:

1200 - White flag raised - 3 horn blasts

1204 - White flag lowered

1205 - Blue flag raised - 2 horn blasts

1209 - Blue flag lowered

1210 - START - Red flag raised - 1 horn blast

Hoisting of flags takes precedence over horn and time of day.

6 hours. Tone yacht finishing within the time limit Time Limit: makes a valid race for all yachts, regardless of time

Special Instructions:

- State your intention to race by sailing past the Committee Boat's stern prior to 1200.
- 2. Fly a white flag approx. 12" x 12" from the backstay.
- 3. Headsails: Working jibs and genoas only. No spinnakers, staysails, flashers or foresail combinations.
- Racers must keep their own elapsed time, to the second, from the START. Make note of the yachts finishing ahead and astern of you.
- Yachts over the starting line early will be hailed. Early starters MUST return to restart around either end of the line. Responsibility for returning rests with the yacht(s) con-
