THE BLUE HERON DROPPED US A NOTE. ...

January 28, 1992

"We're in Georgetown, Exuma, literally pinned to the dock by high winds. We arrived last Friday just ahead of a cold front which went through and then came back to attack. Today, though, shows promise to go to one of the anchorages here to wait for good weather to head for Cat Island which is northeast of here and the start of our northward trip."

"We left Florida, Hurricane Harbor, Key Biscayne, on Jan. 6th and had a good crossing to Cat Cay where we cleared customs along with the 20 some other boats that crossed on the 6th. Eric will have to expound on that adventure later. At any rate, we all, including Heidi, were accepted into the Bahamas for 60 days."

"From Cat Cay we went to Chub Cay having a great sail getting to Chub. After waiting out some weather plus having great happy hours with other boating friends we went on to Nassau. Spent a few days in Nassau again waiting for another front to pass to move on. Finally, the weather was right and many boats departed for Normans Cay. Normans Cay provided a wonderful anchorage for 20 some boats. We deployed our dinghy at Normans and explored the Cay. Not much there anymore due to Vesco and his drug gangs but the water was beautiful and the surroundings peaceful. From Normans we worked our way to Sampsons Cay, Staniel Cay, Little Farmers Cay and to Georgetown. The people on these little cays are neat, clean, and friendly and I guess my favorite was Little Farmers Cay which has a tiny village, an airstrip and yacht club with good food and a delightful owner."

"From Georgetown we plan to head to Cat Island as mentioned, then on to Eluthera, the Abacos and on to West End to wait weather to cross back to Florida."

"We're still wearing shorts, once in a while a jacket, and getting sun tanned so all is well."

" Hi to everyone and look forward to seeing all next spring."




AND HERE'S HOW TO GET THERE __
