NEW YEARS GREETINGS TO CBC'ers FROM TRUMPETER

OH! ENVY We greeted the new year sitting in TRUMPETER's cockpit and enjoying a bottle of bubbly at midnight as we watched fireworks from downtown Key West. Being in shirt sleeves and shorts at midnight sure beats our last few New Years eves!

> We arrived in Key West in early December after a leisurely six week trip down the ICW. Since this was our first trip south of Beaufort, NC we decided to do the "ditch" and we were not at all disappointed. We only "touched" bottom four times, never hard enough that we couldn't back off. We encountered a variety of weather, but what stands out is a period of over a week following two successive cold fronts when we had frost on the deck in Georgetown, SC, "sea smoke" two mornings in a row, and a wild three days with 30 knot NE tailwinds and actual temperatures in the 40's. We each had on 6 & 7 layers of clothing, boots, warm gloves, and ski caps. As soon as we crossed into Florida, the weather warmed and in the past seven weeks we've had shorts on every day but two.

> The Kevs have been interesting and certainly different cruising from what we're used to in the Chesapeake. There aren't many quiet quaint anchorages here but the sunsets are spectacular and the weather has been unbelievable with day after day of sun and 80 degrees. This is as close to paradise as we've ever been! We're on a mooring at Boca Chica marina at the Naval Air Station (one of the few perks left for my 25 years on active duty!) We are in and out, doing lots of needed maintenance and varnishwork after cruising almost 4000 miles since June. We plan to head out to the Dry Tortugas at some point and are looking forward to lots of snorkeling on the nearby reefs and fishing now that we have FLA fishing licenses. We'll leave here in late Feb for cruising West Coast of Florida before heading back to Marathon to cross over and head north. (Unfortunately you can only cross Florida canal with a 50ish ft mast height.)

Look forward to seeing our CBC friends in May and June before we head back to New England. Anyone interested in heading north with us sometime around mid June?? We'll be doing LI Sound, Newport, Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket before heading for Maine in mid July. We highly recommend spending retirement cruising! For anyone contemplating taking off for extended cruising, we are gathering lots of info we'd be happy to share. See you all in the spring!



The latest one, "SEA STORY" is the tale of an around-the-world race, with a marvelous cast of characters... some just barely disguised.


