The Okeechobee Limbo

The Port Mayaca Railroad bridge, located on the Okeeshobee Waterway just east of Lake Okeechobee, has an open clearance of 49 feet, 2 inches at normal water level.

Indiantown Marina, Inc. allows sailboats with Mast heights of up to 53 feet* to be able to transit the waterway. *Please contact marina personnel regarding type of sailboat and scheduling.

Proceedure for tipping your boat

- # We arrive by boat Nd tie our boat to yours.
- # We run a measuring stick tup to the top of your mast
- # We then place plastic barrels on the side deck.
- # Two lines are run from foredeck cleats to cockpit winches to hold barrels in place and take strain off of the lifelines.
- # The barrels are filled with water.
- # the boat operator drives the boat through the bridge.
- # Most times we also have you swing the boom out for extra leverage.


What you need to have ready

- # 2 fenders to lang long ways on the side of your boat where we tie our boat to yours, approximately mid ship*
- # 2 long lines to run from cleats to winches- see proceedures.
- # 1 free halyard that goes to the top of the mast, for running measuring stick.
- * The side of the boat we use to tip the boats varies due to natural list of boat, location of instruments on the top of the mast, and the weather conditions. It's advisable to wait until we reach your boat to make some of these decisions.

Cost for bridge tipping is \$75.00 Advance reservations are preferred.




