WISH YOU'D BEEN THERE!


The cruise this year, starting at Swan Creek on the night of the Fourth of July, was blessed with good weather, good sleeping nights, no jellyfish (therefore great swimming) but, alas, not much wind. In Swan Creek on that first night, LYCK (alias SOUTHERN GIRL, soon to be CERULEAN), PAVANE, CALLISTO, CHANTEY, MARIPOSA, L.B. QUEEQUEG, which George Thomas single handed over, BLUE MIST, with the Powells, out with the club for the first time in a long while, and Larry Ament in his impressive OSPREY, back in the Bay after some hair-raising adventures in his boat in very nasty weather off Cape Hatteras while bringing his boat up from the Islands. He issued a hasty MAYDAY when he discovered a foot of water over his floorboards below and really appreciated hours of help from the USCG. Larry demonstrated marvelous seamanship in this terrible situation, and we hope to get a complete report from him for publication in the near future. A very important "meeting of the minds" took place here. The dinghies from PAVANE, LYCK, and MARIPOSA drifted together aimlessly as the crews plotted strategies for the coming week. On the 5th, most of the fleet motored (drat) up to the Sassafras where some of the boats went behind Knight Island. They were joined there by BRAVO and HARMONY. LYCK encountered the bottom not once, but twice, while trying to enter the protected area behind the island. The cruisers were fascinated watching a DNR boat stalking unsuspecting powerboaters running at night without lights. Interestingly, the DNR boat was lurking in the shadows without any lights itself! START LINE

Between the Committee boat's mast and can "C1" off the mouth of

Gray's Inn creek.

COURSE

Leave N14 to port off Boxes Point,

Leave to starboard, nun N16 off mouth of the Corsica river

FINISH LINE

Between the mast of the Committee Boat and nun "N2" in the

Consida river.

DISTANCE

6.3 Nautical miles

TIME LIMIT

3 hours. One Yacht finishing within the time limit makes the race.

valid for all yachts.

STARTING SIGNALS

12.00- white flag raised - 3 horn blasts

12.04- white flag lowered

12.05-blue flag raised - 2 horn blasts

12.09- blue flag lowered

12.10- red flag raised - 1 horn blast

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS

1. State your intension to race by sailing past the Committee Boat's stern, prior to starting, and make certain to get any last minute instructions from the race committee.

2. Fly a white flag (approx 12" by 12") from the backstay.

3. Working jibs only. No spinnakers, drifters, flashers etc.. No foresail combinations; one headsail only (except for cutter rigs).

4. Racers must give way to commercial shipping.

5. Yachts over the starting line early will be hailed. Early starters must return to restart around either end of the line.

6. Please submit your PHRF rating to our commodore, Bruce Raymond or the race chairman Tom Carey, at any time before the race.
