# FAQ's about Memorial Day Weekend at Wye Island. brought to you by Eastport Yacht Club and The Chesapeake Bristol Club! 

Q. When is Memorial Day Weekend?
A. Memorial Day Weekend is Saturday, May 29 through Monday, May 31.
Q. Where's the DNR Lodge at Wye Island?
A. Wye Island is on the Eastern Shore off of Route 50 on Carmichael Road, just a few miles from the Kent island bridge. The DNR Facility is readily accessible by land and water.
By land: (Allow at least 45 min . from Annapolis)
Take route 50 east, approximately 13 miles from the east end of the Bay Bridge.
Turn right on Carmichael Road (at sign for NWRA and Aspen institute). After about 4 miles., you cross a small bridge. Continue to DNR sign on left. Turn left and follow the road to the end. Plenty of parking.
NOTE: An effort will be made to put out signs at the critical spots, perhaps only two burgees and an arrow. Be on the lookout.

## By water:

Follow the chart up Eastern Bay, Miles River and Wye East River, to Granary Creek, the second major creek in on the left, opposite a duck blind. Stay in the river until you can see straight up the creek, then turn left and enter.
There's seven to eight feet of water in the center of the creek.
The Lodge is just inside the entrance on top of the hill on the left. (Overnight accommodations, dormitory style, bunk beds are available at Wye Lodge on a limited basis. Cost: $\$ 15.00$ per night. Reservations required. For further information, call Bill sieling at 4 10-269-1604.)
Q. What should I bring with me ?
A. A dinghy, (or bum a ride with a friend) as no transportation will be provided.. There is a dinghy dock available.
Near your name tags so the Chesapeake Bristol Club Members will stand out.... as they usually do!
A dish to share on Satur day night, and $\$ 5.00$ in exact change for your $B B Q$ chicken supper.

ALONG a grillable, a delectable dish to share, and beverages of your choice. The rest will be waiting for you ashore.

## EXPLORE

Exploration to the heads of the creeks by dingy is highly rewarding. In Whitehall, a draft of 5 feet can be carried to the house on starboard with the tennis court and the deer in the yard. Ridout carries 5 feet to the white Tate House on starboard with the large dock, which is almost to the head. Canal Creek across from Ridout is a real treat to explore for the first time, and is navigable to the first right with a draft of 5 feet and to end of each "branch" with a draft of up to 4 feet on a medium tide.

- From Rt 50 East, Exit 29A "St. Margarets, Route 179, Cape St Claire Road" Right at stop sign onto St Margarets Road (route 179) First left onto Holly Drive takes you into Amberley
- From Bay Bridge, Exit 29: "College Parkway, St. Margarets, Route 179, Cape St Claire Road" Left at stop sign onto St Margarets Road (route 179) cross over route 50 to flashing stop light.After stop, first left onto Holly Drive takes you into Amberley.
- Keep straight on North Holly at fork. Follow Holly Drive until mail box numbers hit 790+. Turn left onto Oak Lane. Party on the right.

TRY IT ! YOU'LL LIKE IT !

Here is a hint that Bob Lehner picked up from his extensive reading:
To avoid the disastrous results of a prop and its shaft being backed out of its housing when the attachment has vibrated loose (or a maintenance person has goofed and not reattached things), purchase a spare shaft zinc and attach it on the inside portion of the shaft just clear of your stuffing box. You will always have a zinc if it is needed, and the shaft will be captive and cannot pull out.
Perhaps some of you remember an incident in Baltimore Harbor when Henry Good emerged from below on his new boat and said "I think I need a little help !" The folks who had commissioned his new boat had neglected to fasten the shaft and it was a miracle that it and the boat didn't end up 25 feet down in the muck of the harbor.

Such a simple solution to a potentially catastrophic problem.
