After we had finished a nice calorific dessert of cheesecake with strawberries, our speaker was introduced; Drew McMullen, who is the director of the Sultana Project. Drew, a graduate of Amherst, one time portfolio manager in N.Y., moved to the Eastern shore to work in environmental education at Echo Hill Outdoor School where he oversaw the restoration of the buyboat, ANNIE D, and the 1901 skipjack, ELSWORTH. Drew spoke to us with great enthusiasm of the construction of a reproduction of the 1767schooner SULTANA, which is being built at a special shipyard in Chestertown, MD. Throughout the building of the boat the Master Shipwright, John Swain, has run the operation with three other shipwrights, and crews or students who took three to five day classes in aspects of the actual construction. In 1999, over 1,500 students, both children and acults, participated in programs provided by the Sultana Project.

When completed and under sail (2001) she will be a classroom for the teaching of history and environmental science.. with short and long term programming for elementary through college level students as well as adunts. 
Linda Lewis wasn't along for the weekend as she was attending Master Gardener classes. Now we will have a pro


EVENT FOUR: Official Award Ceremony of the Summer O-LIMP-ICS $\pm 7:00$ p.m.

WYE DIVED WEEKEND ! DIDECTIONS TO THE D.JLD. LODGE

BY LAND: (Allow 45 minutes from Annapolis) Take Route 50 East approximately 13 miles from the east end of the Bay Bridge. Turn right onto "Carmichael Road" (at the sign for NWRA and Aspen Institute.) Stay on the main road which becomes "Wye Island Road" along the way.

About 4 miles after leaving Route 50 you will cross a small bridge onto Wye Island.

Continue on the main road (past a sign saying "Wye Island NRMA Conference Lodge, Trails" etc.

Do NOT turn off here onto "Wye Hall Drive".)

At about 1.5 miles from the small bridge you will see a sign on the left, "D.N.R. Conference Lodge" Turn left and follow all the way to the end, where you will find a parking area near the lodge.

BY SEA: Follow your chart up Easter Bay, the Miles River, and Wye River East to Granary Creek., (beyond Dividing Creek) There is a duck blind on the south side of the river opposite Granary. Stay in the middle of the river 'til you can see straight up the middle of Granary Creek, turn to port and enter. You will find seven to eight feet of water in the center fairly far up the creek and in the cove on the left after you enter. There is a dinghy dock in this cove. You will see the Lodge on the hill to your left after you enter the creek.

WHY IS A BOAT CALLED "SHE"?

A ship is called "she" because there is always a great deal of bustle around her;


A BIG BIRD TAKES A HOLIDAY...AND HOW!

A loon in Medford, NJ is very unusual, especially one in the Turner's backyard. As you have figured out by now we are not talking about a bird, but about Loon, our Cape Dory 31. After 7 years of incessant use we decided it was time to take a break from sailing and start some


projects we have been neglecting. Our philosophy had been if the boat is in the water it must be sailed as much as possible and only the necessary maintenance/repairs was accomplished. Now, some of our needs have changed and what we would like to do to spruce Loon up will take longer than one winter season to complete. Also we decided it was time to do some traveling where a boat cannot transport us as

it had on previous family vacations.

As you can imagine a year without salling is going to be tough so to soften the blow we decided to nest Loon in our backyard. After a few phone calls we found a sailboat-friendly trucker and we began to prepare Loon for the short trip home. First, because we live on a narrow but busy residential street, we had the trucker confirm that our driveway was accessible to his rig. The only anticipated problems would be holding up traffic and a slightly in the way stop sign. Also we live in the Pine Barrens where the soil is sandy and the trees numerous. It was determined that the ground was firm enough to support the weight of a sailboat but we were concerned about some dead limbs. Of course our cars have been parked under them for years, but we did not want to take any chances with our precious boat and the suspect branches were promptly removed, even the one that held our daughter's cherished rope swing.



Next we needed to pull the mast and strap it on deck. We have heard that due to corrosion the mast sometimes refuses to part from the hull, but we were lucky; the mast came off



easily and we were able to strap It to the boat on cradles we had constructed. We made a deal with the marina for the use of the seven jack stands for a year and brought them home in our pickup. Then the boat hauler came. He backed his unique trailer under the boat after removing some of the jack stands. He attached his screw lacks to the trailer, strapped the boat down, and off he went. Although we knew Loon was securely perched, we followed her nervously down the road. We are certain that our decision

to bring her to our home will be worth it. The cost of trucking her here was the same as storage in the local maring, but now we have the added convenience of proximity.

Everything went smoothly. Loon is standing in our yard waiting for the renovations to begin. We have a long list of projects and upgrades planned. such as refrigeration, electrical system, and new stove. Some of the rigging needs replacing and the teak needs stripping. The first job is to empty the boat. Our sailboat junk is scattered around the house and it looks like we live in Bacons. It is amazing how much stuff can accumulate after seven years. But, before we know it, we will



be done with everything and sailing with everyone next year.
