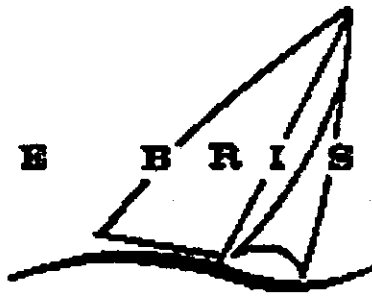

Saturday, July 29th was a typical summer day, high humidity and no wind. Most CBCers had to motor to get to Tilghman Creek for the second annual wine tasting contest.

First on the scene was TALISMAN. Beryl and Bill had just arrived from Shaw Bay where they spent Friday night with the Boeckers. The Boeckers spent Saturday afternoon enjoying the scenery of the Nye River before coming to the party. Bill and Beryl spend the afternoon in their dinghy exploring the many nooks and crannies of Tilghman Creek. Most of the boats arrived between three and four o'clock. The four wines in order of serving were a French Columbard, Burgundy, Chardonnay and Merlot. Seven CBCers guessed at least one out of the four. The third prize was determined by a drawing between the remaining five contestants. Will Hottle was the third prizewinner. Everyone enjoyed the contest and afterwards settled in with gusto to finish the wine and cheese.

## **AND NOW FOR SOMETHING NEW / OLD AND VERY DIFFERENT.....!**

**On Saturday, ~~the 26th of August~~, there will be a rendezvous in Church Creek, up the South River, on the North side.**

**The plan is to visit the Londontowne Public House on Almshouse Creek. We will take one "taxi" boat to Almshouse Creek, because there is not room there for many boats.**

**As the last tour of the house starts at 1500 hrs., captains and crews interested in visiting Londontowne should be at anchor or rafted in Church Creek by 1400 hrs. on Saturday.**

London Town Publik House and Gardens is a National Historic Landmark maintained by the Department of Recreation and Parks. The Publik House, dating to the middle of the 18th century, is the only remaining structure on the site of a once-thriving seaport town. Eleven acres adjoining the Publik House and fronting South River feature native trees, shrubs and wildflowers. Along the winding paths, magnolias, hollies, cherries viburnums, conifers, peonies and Japanese iris are displayed. The Gardens also serve as a testing facility for winter-hardy camellias. Specialty areas include the Winter Garden and Salt Marsh Walk.

Near the Publik House, herbs and 18th-century crops are grown. Garden development began in 1970, and the site opened to the public in 1972.

There are also archeological sites on the property where the remains of the early community are being excavated.

Hours: Tuesday-Saturday 10-4; Sunday 12-4, closed

There is a small admission fee charged.

**Directions by land yacht:** The Public House is 7 miles from Annapolis; take Rt. 2 south to Lee Airport in Edgewater; turn left onto Mayo Rd. (Rt. 253) and proceed 1 mile, turn left onto Londontown Rd.

#### Directions to Sailor's Rest by Land

Sailor's Rest is located on the southside of the Magothy river. The following are directions from Annapolis.

- \* Take route 50 east over the Severn River.
- \* As you are passing over the Severn River bridge stay in your right lane. At the end of the bridge, bear right and then follow the signs to route 2 north, Baltimore. The exit will bend right and then left under route 50. Proceed north on route 2.
- \* On the right you will pass a golf driving range and an indoor tennis building. Move to the right lane and at College Parkway turn right. (I think it is the second light after the tennis building.) When on College Parkway, move to the left lane.
- \* After the second light, stay in the left lane and turn left on Jones Station Road. There should be a sign, "Harding Farms" at that turn.
- \* At the second street, turn left on Mago Vista Rd.
- \* Proceed to the second right and at the elementary school, turn right on Broadwater Rd.
