

Beryl's Zucchini Squares

Source: Ship to Shore I by Jan Robinson

1 cup Bisquick 2 Tbisp. snipped parsley 1/2 tsp. oregano leaves 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1/2 tsp. salt & 1/2 tsp. butter salt (I omitted the butter salt)
Fresh ground pepper, to taste

3-4 small zucchinis, thinly sliced 1/2 cup vegetable oil 4 eggs

1 medium onion, chopped (red preferably)1 large clove garlic, pressed (or chopped)

(no cholesterol ones OK too)

Combine the dry ingredients in a large bowl. In smaller bowl, stir together 4 eggs and vegetable oil. Mix wet and dry ingredients, then add zucchinis, onion and garlic. Spread in greased 9x13 pan. Bake until lightly browned, about 25 minutes at 350. In addition to being a side dish for lunch or dinner, it cut diagonally into small diamond shapes, it will make several dozen delicious hot hors d'oeuvres.

Eventually Rte 288 makes another left turn at a white house with red shutters and a flag pole in the front yard. Turn left here and after a short distance turn left on McKinleyville Rd. The marina is located at the end of the road.

By Sea:Lankford Bay Marina is on Davis Creek near Cackaway Island. Follow the reen markers into Lankford Creek keeping the fire observation tower dead ahead. When you reach the last green before Cackaway Island, turn to port and you'll see Lankford Bay Marina. Loon will monitor channel 09.


out Marsha.! The Segermarks brought two guests, and the Hamnetts had a couple of guests too.
