



The food was so plentiful, the drinks warming, the company scintilating, and the racing


boats so exciting that no-one went ashore for dinner. (They had no tummy space left!)

In the morning Mike and Marcia went ashore for a leisurely breakfast, before heading for home



Nancy and I have bought a home in Clinton, CT, but we still keep our Bristol 29.9 in Mystic. This spring we hope to spend time with our daughter and family near Washington DC before full scale sailing begins here to the north. I am wondering if someone is interested in an exhange?

We will be in the Annapolis area from about May 25 to June 29. We will be absent from Connecticut then and again from about July 15 - August 20.


If you would like to sail Long Island Sound, visiting ports like Sag Harbor, Shelter Island, Greeport on L. I or visit Block Island, Martha's Vineyard, or Nantuckett, or if you want to head up the coast to places like Cuttyhunk, Point Judith, or Newport, RI, this might be for you. Mystic is 7 hours from Annapolis--a lot faster by car than boat.

Our proposal is that you use our boat one or more of the weeks/days above, and we use yours some of the days we are in Annapolis. Since the "Nancy O" was in charter in Mystic before last year, it is fitted for guests. The Bristol is a blue water boat, heavy keel, four sails, and points well. We have radar, GPS, two radios, SOS life vests, etc. She sleeps 5, has sheets, towels, blankets, cooking and dinnerware, barbeque, stereo. Most of the ports listed are as hospitable and as lovely as the Chesapeake.
