THE TORCH IS PASSED . . .

DIRECTIONS FOR USING DINGHY SAFETY DEVICE

- 1. Put Part A (the dinghy) into Part B (the water) and tie Part A-1(the painter of Part A) to the stern of Part C (Arabesque).
- 2. Fasten Part D (the harness) to the stern rail of Part C.
- 3. Attach the bitter end of Part E (the bungee) to the center of Part A. Be sure Part E is stretched tightly between Part A and Part D.
- **4.** Return to Part C and put on Part D (first removing it from Part C) making sure the standing part of Part E is firmly attached to Part D. Step down from Part C into Part A. If Part E does not snap you into Part A without allowing you to go into Part B, go back to step 3 and tighten Part E.
- 4. Leave Parts D and E attached to Part A for future use.

Labor Day Weekend, 2003



BY LAND: Take Highway 50 East to Exit 29A, St. Margarets Road. Left at Pleasant Plains Road (at the church) Follow for approx. 1.7 miles to Cherry Road. Turn right and go .2 mile to Burley Road. Turn right. (follow Burley to the left) The house is 1888.



BY WATER:

From the entrance marker to Whitehall Bay (Fl 4sec "2") bear approx. 320 degrees for half mile to mill Creek entrance marker (Fl R "2") Follow day markers through entrance to Mill Creek giving the last inside marker (R "10" a wide berth. Once past "10" turn starboard (NE) into the entrance to Burley Preek. Take the fork to the port, however, there is shoaling on the port side of the creek just off the retaining wall of the dramatic white contemporary home property. Stay well off before turning N up the creek (See red dot on the chart). Once you pass the house (on the starboard) the creek opens up and there is good holding and good water just a short dinghy ride to the dock.

HALEN ORE

& SUNDAY BRUNCH October 3, 4, & 5

For **The Fells Point Weekend** we have made reservations for ten boats, slips all together. I suggest that members arrive on Friday, October 3, so as to be able to spend Saturday enjoying the fair.



Saturday night cocktails on Broad Arrow at 1700 hours, followed by dinner at a nearby local restaurant at 1830 hours.



Sunday brunch will be held in the vicinity of Broad Arrow and begin at 1100 hours. Joel and Tom have once again agreed to prepare their delicious sausage and apple concoction, and Paul will prepare pancakes for all. Orange juice and champagne will be provided. Everyone is asked to bring something appropriate to share for the brunch. Adam has agreed to have Seaborne available if we have inclement weather. I anticipate that most people will head for home after the brunch is over.

For our annual Baltimore gathering we will be going to the **Baltimore Marine**Center, Lighthouse Point East, Baltimore MD 21244.

To get there by boat head into Baltimore Harbor past Fort McHenry. The Marina is in the Canton section of the city at Lighthouse Point. From the water you will see a large light house to starboard on the shore. The marina monitors channel 16 and when you call to get your slip number, you will be given an alternative frequency to use. For those with GPS the location is latitude 39 16.54 N and longitude 76 38.84 W.

Costs: \$ 2 / day / ft for the slip, \$13 / day for 30 amp service, or \$15 / day for 50 amp service. There is free use of the 40' x 80' pool and free cable TV



The Seaport Taxi makes regular stops at the Marina, by land or water, and can be reached on VHF 71 or call 410-675-2900

Coordination: Our contact is Molly at 410-675-8888, FAX 410-675-3568. When you make your reservation be sure to tell her that you are with the Bristol Club.

Reservations must be made NOT LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 19.

If you cannot sail and must drive to the Marina

Take 695 (Baltimore Beltway) to Interstate 95 North. Follow 195 North to the Ft. McHenry Tunnel. Stay in the right hand lane because you are going to take the very first exit (Keith Avenue) after the tollbooth. When coming off the exit ramp, there will be a traffic light. Make a right onto Keith Avenue. Continue on Keith Avenue. You will pass another traffic light and shortly after the traffic light the road will bear to the right and becomes "Clinton Street". Continue straight on Clinton Street for approximately one (1) mile to the next traffic light. Make a left at the traffic light onto Boston Street. Travel approximately four (4) blocks. The marina is in the 2700 block of Boston Street. You will see a Blockbuster Video and a West Marine Store on your left. Turn left at West Marine. You are now at Lighthouse Point. If you get to the Safeway, which is on your right, you have passed us, please turn around and make a right at Blockbuster Video. The marina office is in front of BoBrooks restaurant.

Take Rt. 97 towards Baltimore to 1695 towards Key Bridge. Continue on 1695 and you will cross the Key Bridge. After the tollbooth, you want to take the first exit, which is Broening Highway. Make a left at the stop sign when coming off the exit ramp. Continue on Broening Highway, passing by the Dundalk Marine Terminal on your left. Continue on Broening Highway for approximately 8 miles. You will pass Point Breeze on your left and a large parking lot will be on your right. Follow the signs to 95, which will be on the right hand side of the street. At the end of the parking lot follow the signs to 195, you will make a right and go around a curve, this will take you to Keith Avenue. Continue on Keith Avenue. You will see signs, which direct you to 195. You want to continue on Keith Avenue, you will see a coal yard on your left, keep going straight. Keith Avenue will curve to the right and turns into Clinton St. just keep going straight. You will see water to your left and will eventually see the First Mariner Bank on your right. Continue on Clinton Street to the first traffic light, which is Boston Street. At the traffic light, you will make a left onto Boston Street. The marina is located in the 2700 block of Boston Street. You will see a Blockbuster Video and West Marine Store on your left. Turn left at West Marine. You are now at Lighthouse Point. If you get to the Safeway, which is on your right, you have passed us, please turn around and turn right at Blockbuster Video. The marina office is in front of BoBrooks restaurant.

From the Inner Harbor Area, you want to take Pratt St. to President Street. Make a right onto President Street. Continue on President Street to Fleet Street. Make a left onto Fleet Street. Follow Fleet Street approximately 10 (ten) blocks to Boston Street (there will be a Royal Farm on your left and a liquor store in front of you). Make a right onto Boston Street. Continue straight on Boston Street until you pass "Bibelot" bookstore on your left and then a Safeway. Directly after the Safeway, you will make a right at the Biockbuster Video. You are now at Lighthouse Point The marina office is located in front of BoBrooks restaurant.

From Rt. 83 to Baltimore. Rt. 83 turns into President Street when you get to the city. Continue straight on President Street. The road will end and curve to the left. You will now be on Fleet Street. Follow Fleet Street approximately ten (10) blocks to Boston Street (there will be a Royal Farm on your left and a liquor store in front of you). Make a right onto Boston Street. Continue straight on Boston Street until you pass "Bibelot" bookstore on your left and then a Safeway. Directly after the Safeway, you will make a right at the Blockbuster Video. You are now at Lighthouse Point The marina office is located in front of BoBrooks restaurant.
