DAY TWO: FRIDAY, 4 JULY,.



As we announced at the spring luncheon at Pirate's Cove, we have scheduled a somewhat different, and very interesting CBC event – a trip to, and guided educational tour of, Poplar Island. There is no charge.

This island, estimated in 1847 to comprise 1,140 acres, supporting 100+ human residents and diverse wildlife, was reduced by erosion to 5 acres 150 years later. In 1994, a team of federal and state environmental agencies undertook a model restoration project of the island, using dredged material. In addition, wildlife inhabitants have been integrated into the beginning process of the island's restoration.

Our tour will focus on beneficial uses of dredged material to form a remote island habitat, as well as aspects of environmental science and cultural history from the 1600s to today. Deb Coons participated a tour last summer and she raved about it.

We will leave by Maryland Environmental Service (MES) boat from its dock, which is located just south of the Knapp's Narrows Bridge, at the east (far side) of Harrison's Oyster Building. We can arrive there by boat or by land. If driving, you should allow time for traffic contingencies, so that you can be sure to arrive by 9:30 a.m. The scheduled tour boat will leave promptly at 10:00. Late participants may be left behind, and arriving at the island by alternate boat transportation is not an option.

After we return to Tilghman Island, we thought it would be fun to gather for lunch – either at one of the restaurants there, or possibly in St. Michaels, or somewhere in between.

Afterwards we'll gather for supper. Bring your grillables and a hors d'oeuvre and side dish to share. There will be a grill available for those who wish to barbecue, and plates, cups, and flatware for your goodies.

For those that want to swim, the pool is open with a lifeguard until 8PM. There are showers in the clubhouse. For those coming early or by boat, this might be a welcome diversion, especially if it is hot.



Directions to the clubhouse.

By boat: As soon as you enter Mill Creek, (off Whitehall Bay) the clubhouse is straight ahead on a hill. It is an older, pale yellow, two story house with a flagpole and a pool overlooking the creek. The marina is to the left and below. Boats can tie to the ends of the first two docks, ("t" ends), and raft outwards from there. Or simply anchor and row to the launching ramp. (CAUTION, ramp is slippery). The one mooring belongs to Mickey Doran and may also be used if needed.

By land:

The clubhouse is in the Providence community. Providence runs along the side of the Navy golf course on Greenberry Point, (where the three tall radio towers are). We are on the north side of the Severn River. At the foot of the Naval Academy Bridge make a right turn, (left turn if you are coming from Rt. 50 and north.) Proceed up the hill on Rt. 648 until you come to a stop light, about one mile). Turn right at the light into the Naval Station: straight ahead is the Navy golf course. Go straight ahead from the stop light, about 500 yards, and make a left on Greenberry Pt .Road. Go 300 yards and make a right on Providence Road. Continue down to the clubhouse on the water. Park anywhere around the clubhouse or in the marina.
